To end everything on a high note Steve took a 45" Sable on the last day. A great time like always.

Bill MacDermaid and Brad Endres met each other on a Matwetwe Safari hunt, and since then has been back here together, 3 more times. This was after they have hunted here separately a few times before that. Two years ago on their previous hunt, Brad said: "I think I have one more in me". Meaning that after his first 5 buffalo with us, he would like to hunt another one. So, we did. Brad also wanted some of the small cats for years and this time lucked out when using the hounds. He bagged both Serval and Caracal cats. Bill didn't bring a backup rifle this time and stuck with his .500 S&W and Blaser handgun in 9.3x62. With these two handguns he took Roan, Fallow Deere, Buffalo cow and a Red Lechwe. Bill also took an outstanding 46" Sable and 46" Buffalo with his handguns. This buffalo is the biggest buffalo Matwetwe Safaris has ever hunted. What a brute! He made no. 4 on the MTT. Congratulations again my friend!!!

This time he was after his first Buffalo but kept his eyes open for anything out of the ordinary as well. Good thing he did because after a perfect frontal shot out of his .416 Weatherby the beautiful 40" buffalo was down on day one. Then the "out of the ordinary" started. We hunted a very nice Vahl Rhebuck of over 8" that made no. 10 on the MTT. Driving around at dusk on the last day my eyes caught something white sticking up above the grass. We read the wind and started the stalk on a real monster warthog. The boar was after a sow in heat and came walking straight at us. At 40 yards he gave us a brought side shot. Perfectly symmetrical and very heavy, he measured $14\frac{1}{2}$ inches outside the gum, which would put him well over 16". Being so hard to find a big hog like that, he made no. 2 on the Matwetwe Top Ten.

If there was a gentleman's award for the year it would have gone to Wayne. What a great guy!









We were so blessed this year with good-hearted people visiting us. Mike & Mary Veele were that kind of people. Because of the variation on their wish list, we had to travel to a few different areas of the country. The hounds treed a big tom caracal cat for Mike while we were down in the Free State area for Mary's springbuck. Mary wanted to finish her springbuck slam with a white and black. She did so with distinction and went on to take a roan amongst several others. She was a superb marksman and became one of only a handful ladies that ever won the HKA. Mike had his sights on a big croc and was rewarded with this nice 12-footer.









Ed Fuller and his friend Dave Grindly came on a bow hunt, but Delta airlines didn't play along so well. They left the bow case back in the US, so for the first 3 days Ed was sightseeing. Luckily, they had booked a 10-day hunt and there was enough time. Dave couldn't stand to only watch, so he took Harm's rifle and started to put some animals on the ground. Eventually he did turn to the bow and took a few with it as well. Ed was a fine marksman with his crossbow and took all his animals with it. He loved hunting gemsbuck and took two of them, but when this brute of a blue wildebeest walked in, he couldn't resist. The bull measured 30" and the carcass was the second largest we have ever taken at 352lbs. The wildebeest got Ed the no. 7 spot on the MTT.









While Ed & Dave were in our main camp, Herman took the Whitefords to another luxurious camp in the area. Pat Whiteford made his son Logan and dad John's dream come true to hunt together in Africa. They took advantage of the huge Warthog in the area and bagged two magnificent hogs. Logan was well prepared and was shooting like a sniper. By the end of July Greg Armock brought his wife Kristi and 3 daughters, Kensey, Delaney and Bailey over for a great adventure. They had lots of energy and were very fun people to be around. Delaney took a 29" Golden wildebeest but it was Kensey that was the big huntress. She took a 17" Blesbuck, 34" Livingston Eland, nice Impala and sable as well. Greg is one of those thoroughbred hunters. For every professional hunter, the ideal client. Physically capable, great shot and always there, ready to act when you need him to. Greg took a nice black Impala and bushbuck, but his main goal was the buffalo. He took a brute of a bull that measured 45 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches with 16" bosses. He made no.8 on the MTT. Halfway through their trip they went to Kruger Park and came back to hunt some more afterwards. While me and Greg smoked some monkeys with his .300 Norma Mag, the girls went to the spa, had sundowners at the Baboon cliffs, visited the croc farm and just had an all-round ball of a time.













While me and the Armocks were at it, Harm and Herman were busy with Dough Cook and his friends. Doug Cook, Josh Rice and Frank Jenkins. They had a great hunt with Josh taking a monster warthog and giraffe, but it was Doug's buffalo cow hunt that made them work. After several stalks she finally stood up at 30 yards and Doug kept it together and put her down with the first shot. They couldn't stop talking about it. Frank took a very good blue wildebeest, springbuck and worked very hard to see the Gemsbuck. He finally was rewarded for an old bull that was way past his prime but a fine representative of his specie.







Dirk Blunck from Rheinfelden, Germany needs no introduction to any frequent Matwetwe newsletter reader. He's been here almost every year since 1999, except for Covid. Dirk's son Ciril definitely inherited his dad's "sniper like" shooting skills. He is starting with the .22 and took 12 different species while me and dad were tagging along. Again, we've had a great time with them in camp, discussing ballistics and relived some of our great hunting adventures of yesteryear. I think soon Dirk will be ready to pick up the .416 again and go on the tracks of a jumbo with me. You just can't get that out of your blood.







Dave & Beth Read were back in August. This time without Bob & Becky. Their daughter Erica and her husband Mike Wellman joined them. Most importantly, it was grand daughter Lilly's trip. At 16 years old she was a well-prepared hunter and took some very nice trophies with clean shots, especially the springbuck at over 200yards. Dave had a score to settle with another buffalo. 2 Years ago, he hunted buffalo and we took 3 days to put that one down. This time, a perfect shot through the heart and a magnificent 44-inch bull was down. Beth took a very good Red Lechwe while we were down in the high country after caracal. Dave got a very pretty tom Caracal that he wanted for years. Erica, Lilly & Mike did their photo safari in Kruger Park and came back to hunt some more. Erica shot a very good sable while Mike took his 6 animals all with one shot and received the HKA.









We took the $8\frac{1}{2}$ hour drive to the Kalahari bushveld and enjoyed the change of scenery and different habitat. On day 2 after quite a lot of tracking in the Kalahari sand the big boy gave us a shot. Joe seized the opportunity and made a perfect shot; we followed up and there he was. Africa's most majestic animal. What a privilege that there are enough people that takes care of these creatures and their habitat so we can still hunt the non-productive ones. Joe went on to take several more animals including a 12-foot croc. He became only the third guy ever to win the HKA a second time. Maybe on his third trip in 2024 he "could" be the first guy to win it 3 times.











While me and Joe were at it, Harm guided Stan Millis and Greg Kovalchick. Stan hunted with us 13 years ago and wanted to come back ever since. They hunted the plains to the east as well as the hills to the north and bagged some beautiful animals. Stan took a big bushbuck on the same day that Greg got his kudu. Greg used a quite out of the ordinary crossbow that fired two arrows at a time. He was a crack shot with it and put those broad heads at the right place six times in a row to win him the HKA.













When we met Mike Aittama in Traverse City last year, we knew we were going to have some extra fun on this hunt. Then in early September Mike brought his son Hunter, son in law Joe and nephew John with him. We've hunted, laughed, partied, laughed, sight seeing to Kruger, laughed, hunted some more and laughed again. Mike showed some other talent he has and wrote a song about the hunt. What a great time we've had! Baboon, Vervet Monkey, Gemsbuck, Waterbuck, Black wildebeest, Blue wildebeest, Ostrich, Zebra, Nyala, Kudu, Springbuck, Impala, Sable and more were on the ground. Both John and Hunter won the HKA. New friends for life for sure!!!













Jeff McMinn an avid bow hunter, hunted with us before. This time he only wanted to hunt a little and do a lot of sightseeing. Getting towards the end of the season in early October we've had another real colorful hunt when the physicians showed up. Brennen & Melissa Kerr, Billy & Rachel Reichard, Danny & Casey Coulter as well as their friend Micah Baumgartner came for their first hunting experience in South Africa. We had a lot of "hunting luck" but I couldn't believe my eyes when we took 3 nice kudus on one day in the hills south of us. Melissa made the shot of the season when she took her Black wildebeest at 358 meters on the open hills of Mpumalanga. Micah was like a kid in a candy store and enjoyed himself immensely. At one stage he had a blue wildebeest and a zebra down only 100 yards apart. Brennen took the biggest Steenbuck in Matwetwe Safari history at 6 inches. Big ones like that are very hard to find, so for that achievement Brennen ended up with the no. 1 spot on the Matwetwe Top Ten this year. All together we were surrounded by smiles and laughter all the time. For sure they will be back one day!













The second last safari of the season was when the brothers, Chad & Adam Druckenmiller came to hunt. It was late October, and many people would think that it is to late in the season to get good quality trophies anymore. This is where the phrase: "you don't take, the bush will provide..." comes in. They both took some real nice trophies, but it was Chad's Sable at $45\frac{1}{2}$ inches and Kudu at 54" that stood out. The kudu dressed out at an astonishing 435lbs. The Giraffe hunt made for a real out of the ordinary surprise when the first shot only stunned him, and he ran straight towards us. Although not a charge, it made for quite an adrenalin rush when this huge animal fell only 15 feet in front of us after Harm and Chad's artillery opened up on him. A great hunt with two great guys!!!









Like two years ago Cary McAfee closed the season for us. This year Sable was the number one animal on his list. Cary got a good one and went on to take Duiker, Steenbuck, Red hartebeest as well as a monster Mountain Reedbuck. Cary always travels by himself, and it was great to hear all his stories and life experiences he shared with us around the fire. A good friend for sure!!!





Again, it is with a humble heart that I look back at the 2023 season. The biggest season ever. The highest number of clients as well as the highest number of animals taken in a single year.
